

# St. Ethelbert's RCP, Bolton Prevent Duty Risk Assessment



The aim of the Prevent Strategy is to reduce the threat to the UK from terrorism, by stopping people being drawn into such activity. We are required to take a risk-based approach to the Prevent Duty, under paragraph 14 of the Hole Office's statutory guidance. This document demonstrates our awareness of the specific risks of extremism and radicalisation in our school and our local area.

**Extremism** is defined as vocal or active opposition to fundamental British Values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. Extremism isn't exclusive to any section of society and can take many forms.

**Radicalisation** is defined as the process by which a person comes to support terrorism and extremist ideologies associated with terrorist groups.
