Some of these types of abuse may result in an immediate referral to Children's Services, without informing parents or carers, in order to protect the child. This is done following strict protocol from Bolton Children's Services.

Early Help

Early Help is a way of bringing workers together to work with children and their families when they need extra support. This could be for any reason including:

- Health
- Education
- Parenting
- emotional well-being
- finance
- housing

Support can be delivered from a wide range of services depending on what is needed; services already working with the family might offer additional help or requests for support could be made to specialist and targeted services. All services in Bolton are signed up to using the Early Help process.

Early Help is for children of all ages up to age 18 – as soon as problems start to stop things from getting worse. Parents can ask for Early Help, or a worker that is already involved with a family may suggest that Early Help support might be needed.
